Now for a little preview, here's the event schedule as it stands now:

Friday, July 19

Registration/Arrival. Wyoming Ave. park in Cody. This is the part directly behind the historic Cody Chapel, which in addition to hosting two wards, also has the wonderful Cody Murals—at can't miss—and an excellent, newly remodeled visitor's center—another can't miss. The church, by the way, is also a can't miss—that is it's hard to miss on Wyoming Avenue.

Speaking of don't miss, you can buy your T-shirts at the registration table.

Dinner 6:00 PM. The dinner will be catered by Holiday Inn, owned by the Teddy Blairs (Ruth-Lloyd-George Henry-Fanny). The menu will be

Saturday, July 20

8:00 a.m. Decorate floats in Cowley. What's this you ask? Well, we'll have three flatbed trailers in the Cowley Days parade (Cowley's version of the Days of 47 parade), each carrying the family members of a different George Washington Taggart wife. Our hope, of course, is for everybody to pitch in and make our forbearers proud! That's a euphemism for let's make some great floats! Cowley, by the way, is about 45 minutes east of Cody, 20 minutes east of Powell, and 5 minutes west of Lovell.

10:00 a.m. Parade – each wife's family sitting on a different float. Should be fun.

11:00 a.m. Pioneer Program in the Cowley church on main street. Greg Taggart will be one of the speakers. This is NOT a George Washington Taggart-specific event, but it is a worthwhile event to attend, especially if you're interested in knowing more about the Mormon pioneers who settled the Bighorn (or is it Big Horn?) Basin in 1900.

12:00 p.m. Lunch in the park. As part of the Cowley Days festivities, the city puts on a BBQ in the park. This is NOT as GTW event, but it is a great place to eat and to meet new and interesting people.

1:00 p.m. Tour Cowley and surrounding area (more on this later). For the kids there all kinds of games—three-legged and sack races, for example.

4:30 p.m. Genealogy program. This will be held in Powell, Wyoming at the 7th Avenue church.

5:30 p.m. Dinner. Food trucks will come to the church in Powell. Everyone chooses what they want to eat.

7:00 p.m. Cowley program. The town of Cowley always holds a program in the log gym (another sight to see), with music, talks, and lots of fun. Again, this is NOT a GWT specific event, but well worth attending.

8:00 p.m. Cody Night Rodeo. For those who would rather attend a rodeo in the Rodeo Capital of the World—sorry Cheyenne—there's the Cody Night Rodeo.

As I said, more information will follow. And I repeat: Make sure to RSVP as soon as you receive the link to the reunion website, which you'll receive later today or early tomorrow.

This year we return to Cody, Powell, and Cowley Wyoming in the Big Horn Basin and all the wonderful Taggart heritage there with a Grand Reunion and celebration of all things Taggart. We'll hold a two-day family party on Friday and Saturday, July 19-20, 2019. So mark your calendar and be there! In addition, Cody is filled with attractions such as its world-famous Cody Stampede Rodeo, the Smithsonian-affiliated Buffalo Bill Center of the West. It is also on the doorstep to Yellowstone National Park - perfect for a family vacation.

A few details on the reunion

- O Saturday, July 20, 2019 is Pioneer Day in Cowley, Wyoming, which among other things, hosts a parade. The George Washington Taggart family will sponsor three floats in the parade, one for each of George Washington's three wives—Clarissa, Harriet, and Fanny. We asking family members who descend from one of those wives to sit on the appropriate float and wave at the crowd. The following link is to last year's Pioneer Day's Facebook Page, which should give you some idea of what goes on in Cowley on that weekend.
- o Immediately after the parade, a service will be held in the Cowley Ward Chapel, at which a member of the family will be one of the speakers.
- o That evening, we will hold a family gathering, which will include a meal, in Powell, Wyoming, a town midway between Cowley and Cody. That meeting/meal will be held

in a chapel in Powell that was built under the direction of Hal Taggart (Grant-George Henry-Fanny) back in the 1960s.

The reunion is in the initial planning stages, so there will be more information to come.

The important thing now is to mark your calendars and maybe even book a room or a campsite. Here's why: Cody has lots of motel and hotel rooms, but it will also have lots of tourists at that time—remember, Cody is the eastern gateway to Yellowstone Park. Powell has a number of motels as well, but it too, will have its share of tourists—overflow from Cody. Cowley has no motels. Lovell, just three miles from Cowley, has a few. We will be emailing you a list of motels and hotels in the area, but hey, you have the internet. Don't wait for us.

Given that they had 16 children and that many of them married and settled in the Big Horn Basin, there are still a lot of Taggarts in northern Wyoming.

What to do in the Big Horn Basin while you're there.


Besides renewing friendships with family members, there's a lot to do in northern Wyoming, including:

 Visit the <u>Buffalo Bill Center of the West</u>, a truly world class facility that holds five different museums, including the Buffalo Bill Museum, the Whitney Western Art Museum, the Cody Firearms Museum, the Plains Indian Museum, and the Draper Natural History Museum. It's all located in Cody.




o Visit the Heart Mountain WWII Japanese American Confinement Site.





This fine museum—again world class—preserves the history of the Heart Mountain Relocation Center, one of eight such camps that held between 110,000 – 125,000 Japanese Americans during World War II. Like the Center of the West, this museum is a must visit. It sits between Cody and Powell.

o Visit the <u>Buffalo Bill Dam and Visitor Center</u>.



Besides these gems, there's always great fishing, hiking, camping in the Bighorn and Beartooth Mountains. There's Yellowstone—50 miles from Cody—and Teton National Park. If you have a boat, you can use it on the Bighorn Lake, which—no kidding—is one of the undiscovered treasures in the United States: A 72-mile-long lake that runs north to south, most of it surrounded by towering walls of what once was the Bighorn River.
